

### A MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO



Dear Friends and Supporters,

2022 will be remembered at Spirit of America for our response to Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine. Russia's war on Ukraine is the greatest threat to freedom and democracy since WWII. I am deeply grateful to the thousands of supporters whose generosity allowed us to respond quickly and on a massive scale. And, I am proud of our team springing into action to meet the moment.

Colleen Denny, a Coast Guard veteran and our Europe Director, was on the ground near the Ukraine border a few days after the invasion. She was joined by Terrell Chandler, a Navy veteran and a director on our field team. They worked side by side with US troops to coordinate Spirit of America's assistance for Ukrainian defenders. Throughout the year, Colleen and Matt Dimmick, an Army veteran and our Europe Program Manager, traveled multiple times to Ukraine and Eastern Europe, delivering lifesaving gear directly into the hands of Ukrainians and funding programs to improve their effectiveness and survivability on the front lines.

Responding to the war in Ukraine was only one of the things our team did in 2022. We implemented 67 projects in 23 countries with the same speed, flexibility, and entrepreneurial problem-solving we demonstrated in helping Ukrainians on the front lines. That included supporting US missions in the Middle East, increasing resiliency in Taiwan by training citizens in crisis response skills, and continuing our commitment to Afghans who escaped the Taliban in 2021.

Your generosity and investment in Spirit of America allows us to do this work and make this impact. Our unprecedented partnership with the US military enables US troops and diplomats to collaborate with our teams, receive our assistance, and help deliver vital aid and goodwill at scale.

Thank you for joining us to demonstrate who Americans are and what we stand for. United we can preserve the promise of a free and better life.

### IMPACT

## TAKING IMMEDIATE ACTION IN A GLOBAL CRISIS

2022 was defined by one crisis: Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine. Understanding that a conflict could be imminent, Spirit of America Europe Director Colleen Denny increased communication with US military and US Embassy Kyiv personnel in the months before the war began. We had supported Ukraine's independence and security since 2015 and were ready to step up again.

"Spirit of America is doing the most humanitarian thing possible in Ukraine: helping to stop the suffering at its source." Within five days of the invasion, Spirit of America was on the ground in Poland, near the Ukraine border. Colleen and her team worked closely with our US partners to understand the most important needs inside Ukraine and provide assistance in real time. Within a month, a Boeing 777 loaded with over 60 tons of Spirit of America-provided lifesaving assistance landed in Europe; the very next day part of that aid

was in the hands of Ukrainian soldiers and civilian volunteers on the front lines. By June we had delivered over 165 tons of assistance, and by the year's end it was over 200 tons.

Spirit of America's efforts in Ukraine were featured on CBS Evening News with Norah O'Donnell and the New York Times, among other outlets, bringing in new supporters who wanted to help Ukrainians defend their freedom.

Our unprecedented partnership with the US military allowed our international operations team to spring into action even before the crisis erupted. We did all this without interrupting our important work in other places such as Taiwan, Mozambique, and Syria.

## DEFENDING FREEDOM AND SAVING LIVES IN UKRAINE

Since Russia's full-scale invasion began in February 2022, Spirit of America has delivered tens of millions of dollars in nonlethal assistance to Ukrainian soldiers and civilian volunteers on the front lines.

Our past work in Ukraine gave us strong and trusted relationships with Ukrainians and US military and State Department personnel. These relationships made it possible to quickly understand and meet needs when the war began.

And our partnership with the US military gave us unprecedented speed and scale. Our donated aid was often in the hands of Ukrainians on the front lines in less than 36 hours from when it hit the ground in Poland.

Working closely with our US and Ukrainian military partners, we provided more than 200 tons of aid in 2022, including:

- > 18,594 ballistic helmets and bulletproof vests
- 21,015 first aid kits and advanced trauma kits
- > 21,620 tourniquets
- 33,000 ready-to-eat meals
- > 100 satellite phones and other communications gear
- > 100 surveillance drones
- Winter clothing
- > 32 4x4 pickup trucks, vans, and SUVs
- > 9 50-passenger buses
- Funding for the repair of military trucks
- Seed funding for a training course for civilian volunteers in the Territorial Defense Forces
- Support for over 1,000 refugees in Poland, including families of Ukrainian soldiers

The Territorial Defense Forces (TDF) Chief of Staff, Brigadier General Sobko, told us that our initial sets of body armor and helmets played a direct role in the ability of Ukrainian troops to hold ground and blunt the advance of Russia's early offensives.

#### » Filling mission-critical gaps as frontline needs shift

During the counteroffensive campaigns at the end of the year, we shifted resources toward equipment that would enhance Ukrainian

forces' speed and maneuverability. We provided binoculars, personal tactical equipment, and ruggedly mobile pickup trucks to all the operational detachments directly responsible for pushing Russians back in key sectors from Kharkiv to Kherson.

We also partnered with the TDF to provide critical startup funding for their

captain's training course and a groundbreaking project to rapidly repair and deploy military grade trucks that were languishing in motor pools throughout the country.





### » Beyond military assistance

98% of our assistance supported Ukraine's military. However, we provided targeted humanitarian support when it could have an off-scale impact, such as sprinter vans for humanitarian organizations along with body armor and helmets to protect the drivers. Those vehicles evacuated injured and vulnerable civilians, and one supporting the devastated city of Kharkiv distributed food to over 15,000 residents each week.

## HELPING TAIWAN PROTECT ITS DEMOCRACY

To stand with a free Taiwan and help the Taiwanese people protect themselves and their communities from a crisis, natural or man-made, Spirit of America partnered with Taiwanese partners and civil society to increase their resiliency. We started building a network of citizens that are trained and equipped to respond to a disaster or emergency. We also helped local civil society organizations expand their training programs, and we worked with the National Fire Agency to pilot country-wide civilian response teams.

# CONTINUING OUR COMMITMENT TO AFGHAN REFUGEES



When Kabul fell to the Taliban in August 2021, Spirit of America worked with the US military to provide emergency humanitarian assistance to over 30,000 Afghans being evacuated by the United States. In Albania, we supported the daily needs of 121 Afghans for seven months as they navigated the complex resettlement process – providing everything from their room and board, to clothing and diapers, to education and healthcare. On March 22, 2022, their long wait was finally over. Spirit of America helped welcome the Afghan evacuees to their new home in America.

## HELPING US TROOPS SUPPORT WOMEN'S HEALTH IN SYRIA



In rural northeast Syria, women's hygiene products can cost up to 20% of the average monthly household income. Working with US Special Operations soldiers, Spirit of America provided 200 women in the Deir ez-Zor region with a six-month supply of feminine hygiene products and prenatal vitamins to help them take control of their health and well-being.

## BUILDING STABILITY AND HOPE IN MOZAMBIQUE

In northern Mozambique, 800,000 people were displaced from their homes due to attacks by an Islamic State insurgent group. Working with the US Embassy, Spirit of America provided jobs to rebuild two schools in Palma serving 450 primary and secondary school students, as well as civic buildings in Mocimboa Da Praia so basic community services could be restored. Our work made the villages there a better, safer place to live, and the progress is helping to prevent a resurgence of the terrorist group.
